Many decisions are made jointly with your parents.	While you may want to get some feedback from your parents, you have to make your own decisions.
You may know your friends for a long time, and most likely, they are coming from the same social background as you.	You will have new friends from completely different social and cultural backgrounds.
Most of the time, you will be told w-hat you should or shouldn't be doing.	You are expected to own responsibilities for every decision you make.
